
Three new members have joined in July, Frank Vass and Joe Schmitt, and Nathan Cooper, so say hi when you run into them.



Lipos Battery 101, Improving the life and power of your lipos. By Robert Farmer, SVF'er

- 1. Charger This is the most important piece of equipment PERIOD. Do not skimp on a charging system there are a lot of cheap chargers out there and a lot of them are inaccurate. I don't care if you buy the best batteries made if you have a lower end charger the best batteries will not last. I recommend Hyperion, FMA, Thunder Power, and even Great Planes Triton chargers are at the top. For performance and ease of use Hyperion (EOS series) and FMA in my opinion are the best. They have built in balancer ports, computer monitoring and upgradeable firmware via the internet no sending your charger in to get the firmware updated for new battery technologies.
- 2. **Storage** this is **Very** important to the life of your lipos. Putting them fully charged or discharged in your hot garage is not storage this will kill your batteries very quickly. Lipos are best stored at 60% capacity or 3.6 to 3.8 volts per cell in a cool environment. I put them in a small fridge in my garage the best temp to store them at is 32 degrees. Now I know your scratching your head about this but it has been tested and not by me by a lab. Lithium batteries hold 90% of there capacity stored at 32F at 60% charge over 1 full year this is the best for storage. If you don't like the fridge idea then 60% charged in a cool place will be fine. Oh on a side note I recommend a metal can and a Ziploc bag to store your lipos in, if using fridge. Place the batteries in a bag, then in the can the bag is to protect against moisture and the can for safety. I have been storing lipos this way for years and I will tell you it works. I have cheap flightmax batteries and never had a problem with them. I had a 2200mah 3 cell that had over 900 cycles and was 3 years old before I retired it. Some people don't believe me, but it is true. I keep track of battery cycles it lets me know what batteries are worth the money. Some of us are on a budget. When a \$20 battery lasts that long it cant be beat

- 3. **Balancing** Do it every time all the time. Always balance this will ensure your cells are matched and you don't over discharge or charge a single cell this will increase power and life.
- 4. **Stress** this is stress you put your battery though if you have a power system that recommends a 20c battery. They are recommending a 20c continuous discharge rating not a battery that is burst rated for 20c. most batteries have continuous and a burst C rating I recommend over shooting the C rating by at least 5c, I usually go 10c so if it says 20c spend the extra 2 or 3 bucks and get the 30c this does a few thing you will have more power throughout your flight and this will make the battery run cooler and not work as hard very handy if your plane doesn't have a lot of ventilation to the pack. Remember you damage lipos if they hit 140 degrees and some days its 120 in Arizona. Remeber less stress = longer battery life.
- 5. **Discharge Cutoff** 3 volts per cell anything under and you hurt your battery. I will usually land around 3.3 to 3.5 volts per cell 3.3 is my cutoff on my esc and 3.5 v is what I shoot for if you use only 80 85% of your usable battery capacity your batteries will last longer. This goes with the stress Part above. Just make sure you never go under 3volts per cell and that is under a load it does not count if you flew till 2.8v per cell then it jumped back up to 3.2.
- 6. **Battery Brands** OK cheap batteries or high end expensive batteries well the choice is yours. Here are my thoughts. If you take care of lipos they way I do the cheap batteries will work fantastic. The difference in my opinion is how hard you can beat on the battery. Cheap batteries if not taken care of will go down fast. High end batteries will last longer if stressed hard not stored correctly and so on. At 4 xs or more the cost, I can't see how it's worth it. I have thunder power and Hyperion batteries as well, and if both are treated nice and stored correctly I can't tell the difference. So if you like to beat up your batteries go high end they will last longer. If you take some extra time and care with your batteries you can make the cheaper batteries last just as long as any other battery, even with care. Now batteries I know are good and cheap *Flightmax*, *Rhino*, and *Turnigy* batteries are all decent batteries. They are all Zippy branded and come from the same factory. These are decent in my opinion. now if you want high end well *Thunder Power* and Polyquest all come from the Enerland factory and *Polyquest* is cheaper, it's the same battery.

THE CLUB CORNER

What do you think is the most important thing that keeps our flying clubs active and growing? We all know that our clubs are the focal point of some great social activity and a great place to fly the projects that are our pride and joy.

Everything becomes secondary however, if we do not maintain and improve our flying sites. Providing a safe, comfortable, and well-maintained site is the glue that holds the club together. Without the field, clubs will fade away.

There is a financial burden we must bear in the maintenance and improvement of the flying fields. Dues are the primary source of getting the basics done. That is how we pay for the bucket of paint, gas for the lawnmower, repairing the start-up table, and other day-to-day needs. If major projects or large repairs are required the clubs must delve into the arena of fund-raising.

What techniques are effective in raising the cash requirements? Let me name a few that come to mind.

Auctions are a good way to raise some cash. Have members clean out their rebuild areas and donate items they no longer use to the club auction. Partnering with a community charity and sharing the proceeds works well. Social events such as "pancake feeds" work for some clubs. Don't forget that AMA has a pool of cash available for club site improvement projects that can fund 10% of the project cost.

AMA has recognized that the subject of fund-raising is important on both the local and national level. Chris Brooks at AMA Headquarters has taken on the challenge of addressing our funding needs. TIPS & TRICKS

Don't cut that wire!

When your cell count gets too high for your speed control's BEC and you want to disable it, cut the positive (red) wire that runs from the speed control to the receiver. If you cringe at the thought of cutting the wire on your expensive speed control, here is a simple solution: buy a short servo extension and cut its positive wire. Plug the servo extension between the speed control and the receiver; now, if you want to use the BEC in another installation, just omit the extension!

Plugged CA Applicators

The long, thin CA applicator tips work great, except when they're clogged or gummed up with dried glue. After you've finished using them, soak them in acetone; they will be clean and will last forever. This will even work for tips that have dried CA on them, and it works great on spray-can nozzles too.

Prop Balancing

I just read in a post about how a propeller was balanced by removing some of the tip of a blade. The better way to balance a propeller is by sanding the back (flat side) of the heavy side near the tip. You can also balance by applying clear dope, colored dope, or CA to the lighter blade. The CA can be sanding for smoothness.

Quick First Aid

If you cut yourself in the workshop with an X-Acto or a razor blade, use CA to close the cut. (You should have a first-aid kit in the shop anyway.)

Tech Ed writes: As an explanation, model lore has this bit about "invented for medical use;" not so. It was invented in 1942 (Eastman 910) in the Kodak labs when they were looking for a new, clear, and stable substance for gun sights (WW II ref.) Medical use came later. It is dangerous to use this for cuts, rather use it as a cover to seal tissue.—the above tips are from the newsletter of the Rogue Eagles R.C. Club, Medford, Oregon

What the hell was on 572's right wing?'

The result of MacNamara's ordnance shortage in 'Nam..... .we 'gave them everything we had..... EVERYTHING!' A true story from VA-25.







For those too young to remember, during the Vietnam conflict, carriers were so woefully short of ordinance that missions were often launched with only a half load just to keep the sortie rate up so that the REMF's in DC would not send out blistering messages about failure to support the war effort, etc.

Given that the loss rate approached, and sometime exceeded, one aircraft a day, all will understand that there was a degree of reticence to launch with less than a full load -- if I must dance with the elephant at least let's make it worth while. Nevertheless, the indomitable spirit of the carrier aviators, and their squadron-mates, prevailed in some rather perverse way.

I have every hope that today's successors to the mantel left at the Cubi 'O' Club bar persevere as well. Kick the tires, light the fires, bolt for the blue and brief on guard -- last one up is lead. Back in 'Nam', if you weren't on USS MIDWAY in Oct 1965, I thought you'd get a kick out of one squadron's ingenuity. Yes, this really happened. Once again history is stranger then fiction, and a lot funnier:

The USS Midway VA-25's Toilet Bomb.

In October 1965, CDR Clarence J. Stoddard, Executive Officer of VA-25 'Fist of the Fleet', flying an A-1H Skyraider, NE/572 'Paper Tiger II' from Carrier Air Wing Two aboard USS Midway carried a special bomb to the North Vietnamese in commemoration of the 6-millionth pound of ordnance dropped. This bomb was unique because of the type... it was a toilet!

The following is an account of this event, courtesy of Clint Johnson, Captain, USNR Ret. Captain Johnson was one of the two VA-25 A-1 Skyraider pilots credited with shooting down a MiG-17 on June 20, 1965. Clint Johnson was also a classmate and Company-mate of mine at the Naval Academy.

572 was flown by CDR C. W. 'Bill' Stoddard. His wingman in 577 was LCDR Robin Bacon, who had a wing station mounted movie camera (the only one remaining in the fleet from WWII).

The flight was a Dixie Station strike (off South Vietnam) going to the Delta. When they arrived in the target area and CDR Stoddard was reading the ordnance list to the FAC, he ended with 'and one code name Sani-flush'.

The FAC couldn't believe it and joined up to see it. It was dropped in a dive with LCDR Bacon flying tight wing position to film the drop. When it came off, it turned hole to the wind and almost struck his airplane.

It made a great ready room movie. The FAC said that it whistled all the way down. The toilet was a damaged toilet, which was going to be thrown overboard.

One of our plane captains rescued it and the ordnance crew made a rack, tailfins and nose fuse for it. The squadron flight deck che ckers maintained a position to block the view of the Captain and Air Boss while the aircraft was taxiing onto the catapult. Just as it was being shot off we got a 1MC message from the bridge, 'What the hell was on 572's right wing?'



Easy Fin Alignment

When I glued a vertical fin to an aircraft, I always had difficulty keeping it at 90 degrees to the stabilizer. I eventually made a jig to solve this problem. First, I installed the stabilizer. After the glue had dried, I used my 90-degree jig to hold the fin in place. Just clamp it to the stabilizer and then to the fin. Keep everything clamped while the epoxy cures, and then unclamp the jig, and you'll find the vertical fin in perfect alignment.


